Real Railroads

Ken Howard again shares a few railroad pictures of his fall foliage sojourn to upstate New York and points in between. There's a lot of life in Staunton, Virginia these days on the former C&O and B&O lines – now the Buckingham Branch of Virginia Scenic Railroad and the Shenandoah Valley Railroad, respectively. The historic station in Staunton was first built in 1856 by the Virginia Central Railroad, burned during the Civil War and rebuilt in its current form in 1906. The station is now used by the Virginia Scenic Railroad, Buckingham Branch, the Shenandoah Valley Railroad, and Amtrak. If you visit Staunton, take the time to wander around – you'll find a lot of old rolling stock and a lot of railroad history to enjoy.
