Addendum to A Primer on Headend Passenger Cars by Randy Foulke

I realized after my presentation on *A Primer on Headend Passenger Cars* at the General Membership meeting on April 17, 2025 that I had forgotten a very important business using express reefer cars. Flowers were a significant portion, both by volume and revenue, of business for Railway Express Agency, Pacific Fruit Express, Santa Fe, Atlantic Coast Line, Pennsylvania, and Great Northern express reefers. Shipments from Arizona, California, and Florida to the east



coast and Midwest predominated. As you might expect, the days prior to Valentine's Day were the busiest time of the year. Flower shipments by express reefer had dwindled by 1959 and were gone by the early 1960's. Flower shipments transferred to the highways and air. Today, most flower shipments are by air, although rail has made a modest comeback using mechanically refrigerated containers as pictured to the left.

Someone at the meeting mentioned that Amtrak "tried running" express boxcars. Amtrak started its non-passenger mail and express business with its own startup in 1971. Mail and express were handled in Heritage Fleet conventional baggage cars purchased from member railroads. In addition to Heritage Fleet cars, there were three types of equipment for Amtrak's Mail and Express service:

- First were the 1400- and 1500-series Material Handling Cars (MHCs), which were 61 feet over end sills. The MHCs were delivered in 1986 and 1988 and were used almost exclusively for bulk mail shipments.
- Second were the standard-design express boxcars, numbered in the 70000- 71000- and 71200-series numbers. The express boxcars were delivered in 1997, and because they lacked HEP pass-through cabling, they were restricted to rear-of-train service.
- Third were the standard design mechanical refrigerator cars leased to *ExpressTrak*. The dedicated equipment was removed from service in 2004 (2006 for *ExpressTrak*).

The picture on the left below is an MHC. MHC cars were painted in four different schemes. The center picture is an express box car. They were painted in three different schemes. Many MHCs and a few express boxcars included a USPS logo on both sides of the car. The right hand picture is an express reefer, and they existed in two different paint schemes.



Amtrak also tried using *Roadrailers* for hauling bulk mail shipments. A *Roadrailer* is a specialized semi-trailer designed to transition seamlessly between road and rail transportation. It's essentially a truck trailer with built-in rail wheels that can be deployed to connect to a train. This allows for intermodal freight transportation, where goods can be moved efficiently

between roads and rails without the need for flatcars or cranes to load the trailer. The *Roadrailers* used by Amtrak included side doors on both sides and were unique to Amtrak. The side doors allowed for transfer of bulk mail at stations like a baggage car. The *Roadrailers* were painted in two different schemes, and many had a USPS logo or the words "U.S. MAIL CONTRACTOR" on both sides. The picture shows a string of *Roadrailers* on the end of an Amtrak Train.



In theory, Amtrak being in the express business seemed like a good idea, in the sense that adding a few cars to the headend or rear of a passenger train would have few costs. But the equipment was not cheap, the switching moves shuffling the equipment at stations were time consuming and expensive, and the impact on passenger convenience was severe. Too much had changed since the days of the traditional pre-Amtrak headend mail and express business. An interesting idea that should have worked, but it was poorly executed.

Like the Amtrak SDP40F in a previous generation, the MHCs experienced some high-speed derailments on the BNSF in the 2000's, and were restricted to 60 mph on that railroad. This was not practical for passenger train service. Amtrak sold off the express boxcars to freight operating entities and let the lease run out on the express reefers. Most of the MHCs were placed in storage. A few were transferred to maintenance-of-way service with Amtrak and Class II and III railroads. Some MHC's still reside in storage. Most of the *Roadrailers* were sold to Norfolk Southern and could be seen for many years in the Amtrak paint scheme patched with *Triple Crown Service*.
