Proposed Timonium Train Show Trip by Randy Foulke

Several NRV members have approached me about scheduling a trip to Timonium, MD for the next train show on January 31 and February 1, 2026. Show hours are 9 am to 5 pm on Saturday and 9 am to 3 pm on Sunday. Mike Militello of Makin' Tracks, a vendor at our train show, owns and operates The Great Scale Model Train Show. The show is held at the 150,000 square foot "Cow Palace" on the Maryland State Fairgrounds. The winter show is the largest of three, and is considered to be the second largest train show on the East Coast after Amherst. From my past experience, the quality of the show is much better than Amherst.

Travel time from Raleigh to Timonium from the Clubhouse is 5 hours and 40 minutes (not including stops). Travel can be by carpool or a rental of passenger van, if there is enough interest. There are three options for attending, all of which I have done in the past:

- One option is to make it a day trip, leaving at 4:30 am and returning around 10:30 pm. This is a long day and can be exhausting.
- The second option is to leave Friday late afternoon, stay one night, and return on Saturday night.
- The third option is to leave on Friday early evening, stay two nights and return about 9:30 pm on Sunday. From my experience it is hard to see everything in two days particularly if one of the Baltimore area train clubs has an open house visitation for train show attendees.

Currently, a special attendees lodging rate of \$84 per night is offered by the Hunt Valley Holiday Inn Express, located just 9 minutes north of the Fairgrounds. In order to get the special rate, arrangements need to be finalized as soon as possible, but probably no later than the Membership meeting on December 18, 2025. 



Randy Foulke Trivia Question Answer:

Raymond Loewy was personally asked by President John F. Kennedy create a new paint scheme for Air Force One. Loewy worked closely with First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy to implement the preferences of color and typeface of President Kennedy. The paint scheme continues to the present 747 (VC-25A) presidential plane.

Loewy as born in 1893 in France, served in the French army in WW1, became a naturalized US citizen in 1938, and died in Monte Carlo in 1986. His career as an industrial designer spanned 70 years. He was hired by NASA in 1967 and worked until 1973 to assist in the interior design of Skylab. Loewy was responsible (as the Habitability Consultant) to improve the psychology, safety, and comfort of manned spacecraft. The principles he developed continue in manned spacecraft flight today.

Loewy's most recognized railroad designs are the exterior styling of the Pennsylvania Railroad's GG-1, T-1 steam engine, and the Baldwin shark-nose diesels. Loewy was also responsible for a number of exterior color schemes and interior designs of passenger trains including the PRR Broadway Limited, the NP Vista-dome North Coast Limited, and the MP Eagle streamliners.

Loewy also designed corporate logos, many of which are still in use, including Shell and Exxon. Loewy also designed appliances, farm tractor exteriors, truck exteriors, automobile exteriors and interiors, vending machines, and tobacco packaging. The press referred to Loewy as *The Man Who Shaped America*, *The Father of Streamlining*, and *The Father of Industrial Design*.
